South Africa and the G20 Presidency SARA PIENAAR

SA as G20 Chair 2025

Formed in 1999, G20 is G-7 Mega-Economies plus 12 other significant global economies, many still 'developing' e.g. Brazil, Mexico, Indonesia, India and two Blocs - EU and (2023) AU. Brings developed and developing countries together to discuss financial and global issues.

85% of world GDP, 75% of international trade and 60% of population.

Other developing economies have held the presidency, but SA is the **first and only African state to do so.** SA is the only African member state. Dates back to flavour of the month days. In 2024, promised to promote Nigeria as a mem.

It's still the <u>largest economy in Africa</u> by most measurements. GDP (market value of all goods and services) around \$400 billion with Egypt, Algeria and Nigeria next. BUT

SA is also the most unequal (of those measured) country at GINI 63.

Southern Africa countries also rate very highly on GINI – Namibia being 2nd.

SA also has perhaps the world's highest recorded unemployment rate officially 32%, Actually miles higher. 70% youth unemployment e.g. and its economy is extremely shaky see debt: GDP ratio at 75%

What will this mean for SA and for Africa?

Africa rarely in the news unless it's a disaster e.g. Sudan. Hopes for positive world notice. Expectations enormous. Much hype and excitement.

Cyril Ramaphosa president of SA and for 2025 the G20.

Aim is to showcase development issues of Africa and the South and get help in promoting their interests and measures to achieve employment-based economic growth. Plus, all the usual disasters and 'reform of international financial architecture' (?)

During 2025, at least 230 G-20 meetings will be held in SA, seemingly all in Johannesburg, plus a huge summit in November. The first-ever G20 on African soil.

Cost will be very high, but business and philanthropy are stepping in to help. Run and organised by DIRCO. Advisory committees of 'experts' have been formed to advise SA main players. One, the T20 (Think20) includes my old employer and two other fp think tanks

Conclusion

Challenges are many and various, including

- 1. increasing **division** between pro-western and pro-Chinese/Russian-led anti-western grouping which is attracting increasing support from South. NB BRICS.
- 2. If **Putin** comes, will he be arrested and handed over to The Hague?
- 3. What to do about **Trump** at the Summit?
- 4. Can the problems of Africa etc. be **presented positively**, so as to attract help and not pity, or worse?
- 5. Can the G20 be more than a **talk shop**? Can it **bring results**?

The demand was for

"FREEDOM, PEACE AND JUSTICE"

The War in Sudan

A brutal war broke out in Sudan in April 2023 between the national army and a renegade paramilitary force:

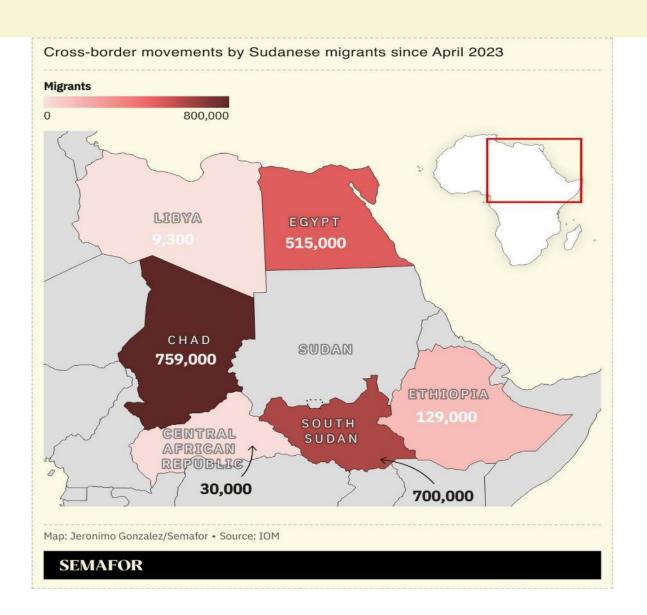
- •The Sudan Armed Forces (SAF) the country's official military that includes the army, air force, and navy.
- •The Rapid Support Forces (RSF) a regional paramilitary group created by a previous military regime.

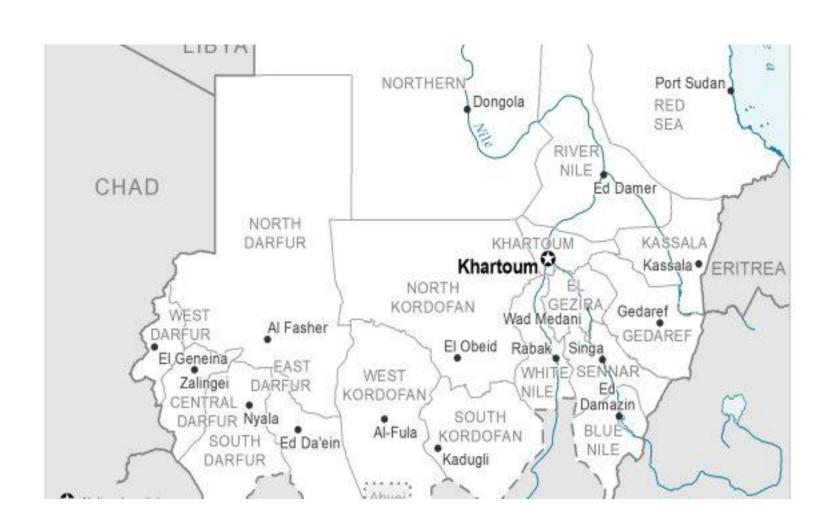
Why are the SAF and RSF fighting?

SAF and RSF used to be allies, but that changed after they overthrew a civilian reform government in October 2021. RSF commander Mohamed Dagalo (aka Hemedti) sees himself as Sudan's rightful dictator, while SAF generals believe they are the true government. It's worth noting that the vast majority of Sudanese want neither in charge of the country.

There are also significant ethnic dimensions in this war that cannot be ignored:

- •RSF- Top RSF commanders and most of their fighters hail from Arab tribes in the western Darfur region. Many RSF fighters adhere to an extremely racist, Arab-supremacist ideology. The belief system states that Darfur's historic African tribal groups must be cleansed from the region and that all other Sudanese Arabs are inferior.
- •SAF Top army brass are mostly Nile Valley Arabs, representing the most elite and privileged ethnic groups in the country. Unlike the RSF, the army is a fairly diverse force with soldiers from most parts of the country. Arab racism toward African tribes does exist in SAF, which explains why members of the force have executed civilians on an ethnic basis as well.

Lobito Corridor Railway

President Biden uses his visit to Angola to promote major African Rail Project, September 2024, from Copperbelt (very valuable and rare minerals-lithium) in DRC and Zambia with Atlantic Ocean.

China now re-instating Tanzam (now called Tazara) railway from DRC to Indian Ocean, new concession signed 4

September 2024

Lobito Corridor Railway follows the same line as the original Benguela Railway



<u>Benguela railway - Wikipedia</u>

- -started in 1899 and completed in 1929;
- -passenger trains between Lubumbushi and Lobito(Benguela). (shortest route for Europeans working in Copperbelt in Congo and Northern Rhodesia returning home)
- -route proved very successful especially in 1970s after Zambia closed border with Southern Rhodesia
- -railway badly damaged in Angola Civil War, following independence in 1975 (mines-Halo Trust)

Lobito Corridor History & Background

Formerly the Benguela Railway linking the Copperbelt in Congo and northern Zambia with Atlantic Ocean

TanZam Railway (now Tazara)

- Financed and built by China (19 500 Chinese working on the railway)
- Construction started in 1970 and completed in 1975 (signings in Tanzania by Julius Nyerere and in Zambia by Kenneth Kaunda)
- Length 1860 km and much in very difficult terrain
- Fell into disrepair and maintenance issues
- New concession signed with China on 4 September
